APPROVAL FOR RELEASE OF PUBLIC RECORDS

Texas Government Code, Chapter 552, gives you the right to access government records; and an officer for public information and the officer's agent may not ask you why you want them. All government information is presumed to be available to the public. Certain exceptions may apply to the disclosure of the information.

Governmental bodies shall promptly release requested information that is not confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision, or information for which an exception to disclosure has not been sought.

All public information requests go through the City Attorney before approval for release.

6. Who decides when the Willow Park Fire Department will assist in incidents outside Willow Park? Who asks for assistance from other fire and emergency entities when Willow Park needs assistance with incidents inside Willow Park?

Automatic Aid Agreements are response plans that have been built and agreed upon between agencies prior to an incident. The plan is uploaded to the County's Computer Aided Dispatch System (CAD). When a call is received by Parker County Fire Alarm it is given a call type. The call type is matched with the response plan for its geographic location and the appropriate resources are sent. Automatic Aid allows districts solve common issues like staffing and access issues that are encountered on a regular basis. Automatic Aid Agreements are generally formed with a mission in mind.

Mutual Aid Agreements are agreements that are formed to be broader and less specific. The agreement essentially states, "I will help you if you help me." A few terms may be included as to how long and how often resources can be utilized.

The Willow Park Fire Department utilizes both styles of agreements with agencies within the county. The person who normally requests resources will be the incident commander for whatever incident is taking place. The Willow Park Fire Department officer staff (Captain, Deputy Chief, Fire Chief) then decides if it can fill the request based on the resources available. Similarly, if the Willow Park Fire Department responds to an incident where the incident commander determines more resources will be required, a request will be made to surrounding agencies for assistance. The Willow Park Fire Department is a good neighbor and provides assistance on a regular and consistent basis, but Willow Park will <u>always</u> remain the priority for the Willow Park Fire Department.
